Language to Liberation

The independence of Bangladesh was a bloody event – paid with a high price in life. 'Language to Liberation' offers an insight into the formation of a new nation state, from the initial seeds planted by Quaid-e-Azam (Father of the Nation) Muhammad Ali Jinnah's declaration that Urdu would be Pakistan's only state language. Moving through the 1970 national elections, where Sheikh Mujib's Awami League won a landslide victory, the guerilla war campaign carried out by the 'Mukti Bahini' (Freedom Fighters), to the Indian forces entering the capital, Dhaka, the film plays out a journey, leading to a 'Land of the Bengalis.'

Set during the anniversary commemoration held at Altab Ali Park, East London, 'Nora' offers a glimpse of a remarkable woman, whose courage and selflessness extended to a people she had never met before, leading her to take on a major role in the Bangladesh Liberation War, from Britain. Searching for 'guns with night vision,' to having a direct involvement in the release of 'Bangabandhu' Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, the film reveals how a young woman from Ireland formed a love affair with a far-away country, a foreign language and, along the way, the man she would marry.
